Have you ever wondered how our ancestors got around before the advent of trains? Come hear the exciting story of stagecoaches and their fearless drivers. Kathy Graves will present a program reflecting her research as she introduces audience members to the world of stagecoaching in Northern California and into parts of Southern Oregon.

Kathy Graves worked in the public education world for 37 years as a teacher of elementary age children, a school librarian, and later as the county library media center



director. According to her parents, Kathy was born a horse-crazy child, but did not discover horse-drawn carriage-driving until sometime around 2002. A love of local history and the discovery of an original mud wagon stored at the local fairgrounds fueled an interest in stagecoaches and the stagecoach era, and a desire to learn more about that world. Kathy has spent many happy hours driving along portions of what was the California-Oregon Stage Road, aka "The Big Road," in both Siskiyou County in California, and Jackson County in Oregon, visiting extant stage stations and reading about the lives and adventures of all of the stake-holders in the stage-coaching world (drivers, passengers, hostlers, farriers, the horses, the stage stations and stops).

Grants Pass Genealogical Society's 50th Anniversary

In 1968 nineteen family historians got together to form a genealogy club in Josephine County. After composing bylaws and finding a place to hold meetings they named their club the *Grants Pass Genealogical Society*. Since that time, the Grants Pass Genealogical Society has been in continuous operation with a focus to educate and mentor anyone interested in tracing his or her family history.

Among the first services offered to members and the community were free genealogy workshops held twice a month for many years. Fund raising focused on donating genealogy books to the Josephine County Library in Grants Pass, and a partnership with the PAF Users Group located at the Grants Pass Family History Center.

For many years obituaries from the Grants Pass Daily Courier were compiled into a book and placed at the Josephine County Library, Grants Pass Family History Center, and the Family History Library in Salt Lake Utah.

Over the years the Grants Pass Genealogical Society has evolved and kept up with new research tools,

providing an informative Facebook page and webpage. Going back to its roots, the Grants Pass Genealogical Society continues to mentor and provide interesting speakers at monthly meetings, co-host the October Community Seminar, produce a monthly newsletter, and sponsor a free genealogy workshop each September.

Plans to celebrate the 50th anniversary include an anniversary luncheon on May 8th, a float in the Boatnik parade on Memorial Day weekend, a special guest speaker on September 11, and awarding a \$500 scholarship to a college-bound youth from a local high school.

The Grants Pass Genealogical Society continues to live up to its slogan, "Educating Family Historians for Over 50 Years."


Financial News - Annual Fund Drive Launch

Spring Seminar - We Were Wowed!

Thanks to Rick and Pam Sayre, we now know a lot more about The Power of Google Earth. The challenge is to find the time to explore the immense and intriguing possibilities for tracking our ancestors across the country and the world; for locating them on land ownership maps; for creating map stories about our ancestors and their places; and much, much more. And that was just the jam-packed two-hour workshop on Friday.



During Saturday's Seminar, Rick brought us a much fuller understanding of the richness of military resources. and a clearer realization of the importance of knowing about the war, knowing the records for each war, and knowing the law. The pension laws varied on who was eligible and when, and kept changing. Some provided pensions only for soldiers disabled during the war; later pensions were awarded based on length of service, then there were the detailed rules for widows and children of soldiers which also changed from law to law and war to war. The in-depth study of the Civil War provided a much

clearer recognition of the


details available to the serious and careful researcher.

During Saturday's Seminar, Pam provided us with an in-depth analysis of the history of Missouri, a crossroads state with Spanish and French land grants, a land divided by its physical characteristics and shaped by a bit of politics as well as geography. Anyone with ancestors who settled even briefly in Missouri gained a great deal of understanding of how these factors affected who settled where in the state. Those who don't have Missouri ancestors got a glimpse of how an in-depth analysis of their ancestors' states will aid them in understanding why their ancestors settled where they did. Pam also revealed the treasure of research resources for our many rural ancestors. Were they farmers? Were they small manufacturers? Now we know how much more we can find out about them and where to look.




Jackson County Cemetery Map Project

RVGS has partnered with the Jackson County GIS (Geographic Information System) mapping department to link the RVGS Cemetery Project with their mapping technology. Click here to go the Jackson County Cemetery application. Once there, you can zoom in on any public cemetery in the county. (Hint – the splashes of green on the map are the cemeteries.) If you can't find the cemetery you are looking for, just begin typing the name in the search box at the top of the screen. Once you find a cemetery, click on it and an information box will pop up. Click on the cemetery photo, and you will be taken to the JCGL Cemetery/Death Records webpage. There is also a link at the top of the Jackson County map screen that goes directly to our site. Spotlight on Historic Cemetery Preservation

Volunteers of the Jackson County Genealogy Library (JCGL) became aware that records of many unknown or forgotten burial sites were not represented in the library's massive cemetery records collection. Efforts are now underway to add to the records collection. This one in a series of articles describing newly discovered cemeteries and burial sites throughout the county.



Geary Cemetery by Chuck Eccleston

The small Geary Cemetery can be seen alongside Elk Creek Road several miles from its intersection with Crater Lake Highway. Four markers are located within the weather worn split rail fence. The most prominent is the tall stone for 13-year-old James Lewis Geary. He was born on January 9, 1887, and died on Christmas Day, December 25, 1900. A second marker for Jimmie Geary is nearby. The remaining two markers are for 25-year-old Erwin Shoemaker (1882 - 1907) and the "Day Hawk" infant girl (1926 - 1926). These three markers are each a short one-legged metal mortuary marker with text in a small window listing name, date of birth and death.

James was the oldest of eight children born to Samuel E. and Maggie J. Geary. James' father, Samuel, is listed as a seven-year-old son in the Jackson County 1870 census along with six siblings, all born to Lewis C. And Maranda M. Geary. Lewis was a wagon maker from Pennsylvania, and his wife Maranda was from Tennessee. Land records indicate that this site is located in the vicinity of the Geary family farm.

Erwin Shoemaker and Day Hawk names did not appear in the Jackson County records searched for this article.


The relatively young ages of the persons buried in this plot suggest the possibility of additional unmarked graves. A survey using the dowsing rod method located 13 unmarked graves within and around the cemetery fence. A map of the cemetery follows this article. A paper copy of the map is filed in the Cemetery Records at the Jackson County Genealogy Library.

NEWSPAPER RESOURCES at
Jackson County Genealogy Library

Newspaper research is growing in popularity, as has the concern that many of the newspaper subscription websites have grown too expensive for our society to offer at the present time. Here are some suggestions for alternatives to the newspaper subscription websites:

- 1. Several of the subscription websites JCGL subscribes to include some newspaper research options. The biggest selection is found at *My Heritage* by scrolling down and finding "Newspapers" in the list of resources on the right side of the screen. *Fold3* has 54 titles listed under "Non-military Records Newspapers." Both *Ancestry* and *American Ancestors* have abstracted vital records (mostly marriages and deaths) in newspapers. Searching newspapers on *Find My Past* will provide a goodly number of hits, but our library edition does not provide actual access. (The citations are still leads to possible clues, though.)
- 2. <u>Chronicling America</u> provides free access to digitized newspapers from 1789 1963, although most stop in 1922 due to copyright. More newspapers continue to be added. This site also provides a complete list of all newspapers published in the United States from 1690 to the present, a very useful resource for genealogists!
- 3. <u>Fulton Postcards</u> is an amazing website with an incredible number of old New York newspapers and some from other states, too. It started with postcards of Fulton, New York, but morphed!
- Historic Oregon Newspapers and California Historic Newspaper Project are just two more examples of the FREE digitized newspapers websites available on the Internet. Try a Google search for the state where your ancestors lived.
- 5. Cyndi's List. Search under "United States (name of state) Newspapers."

Newspaper research has its own search challenges, often requiring our knowledge of the place of publication, specific dates, etc. Be sure to try many different searches such as one name in quotes, and especially "exact" or "advanced" searches to save time. Don't forget that many newspapers served as a regional newspaper. The local *Ashland Tidings* is a good example: When it began in 1878 Medford literally did not exist, and even after it started to develop, the *Ashland Tidings* was the regional newspaper for many years. You may find a similar newspaper near where your ancestors lived.

Keep in mind that all these websites are a work in progress. Check back with them often to see if your area has a new publication. See you at the library and Happy Hunting.

Library's hours have been expanded: The Library is now open Tuesday through Saturday, noon to 4:00, and the use fee has been waived for Jackson County residents. The contract also will result in Internet access to many more digitized photos and full-text documents on the <u>SOHS website</u>. All the issues of the Society's magazine are available online at <u>SOHS Magazines</u>, which includes a link to an index and links to each issue. What is now *Southern Oregon History Today* began in 1981 as the *Table Rock Sentinel* and continued under a variety of titles with varying frequency. Explore the SOHS website for fascinating glimpses into Jackson County history, and a rich resource for researchers.






