Vitis California has grown wild here since time immemorial, and its fermented, fruity, alcoholic brew has long graced our tables. Vitis vinifera, Europe's cultivated varieties brought new opportunities and expectations and in the

1960s and 70s, the age of modern winemaking was born right here in Southern Oregon. Rogue Valley wineries are well known, and their stories often told, but there are back stories, mysteries and histories that intrigue the mind, engage the imagination, and delight the palate. A remote tasting is planned as part of this Zoom presentation to demonstrate the evolution and sophistication of today's award-winning Southern Oregon wines. This non-profit offers FREE access to its resources and services online at FamilySearch.org. This class will explore how to search for records on FamilySearch.org and some of

Tuesday, March 2, 10:30 AM - 12:00 Noon, Class: "Murder in the Family"



In this class, Deb Root Shell will describe how reading a mysterious word on a cemetery headstone set the presenter off on a yearlong search for the "rest of the story." The presentation takes the listener through

the research technique and sources used in her research, making a number of twists and turns along the way, and unraveling a family "secret" and community event that is still discussed and debated today. Cost: Members \$10, Non-members \$20

Brian Rhinehart will teach this second of the Civil War classes. Civil War soldiers often left a rich genealogical paper trail. Many of these records are tucked

The profile of a Quaker (Friend) can be as distinctive as a fingerprint with their unique ethnic origin, belief system, marriage practices, and separate record structure. This session will teach you the profiling techniques you'll need to spot a Quaker in colonial America.

SIMPLY AMAZING - US Quaker Records Online

In 2014 Ancestry.com released its US Quaker Meetings records after years of scanning and indexing. These religious records span the centuries from 1681-1935. By using this subscription website, original records can be viewed online, by browsing the film images or with the aid of a comprehensive index. Learn how to navigate the site and see examples of the basic Quaker record types. A must for anyone with an ancestral brick wall in colonial America.

QUAKER MIGRATIONS - Across Ye United States

How do you find lost Quaker families? FOLLOW THE

MEETINGS. Learn how to track your Quaker ancestors by following the opening and closing of monthly meetings they attended. Then marvel at an animated video clip of Quaker meetings marching across the country for 350 years. You won't believe your eyes!

YE BEST BOOKS - for Quaker Research

Before the world wide web and the age of Internet documents, books were one of the family historian's most available assets. In the Quaker way, they allowed an expanding nation to share knowledge when the original records were concentrated in only a few repositories. While derivative materials are less reliable as sources, they play a valuable role as “Finding Aids” to help you locate the original record for your Quaker ancestors, or to understand if it even exists.



Library Collection Report

Each year in December we take inventory of the Library Collection, except in 2020 due to the pandemic. Consequently, we do not have all the usual collection totals to report. However, 2020 was an extraordinary year, for many reasons! Here are the statistics we have:

1,262 items were accessioned by the catalogers in 2020 (804 in 2019)

12,426 books in the library collection (11,245 in 2019)

154 maps in the library collection (100 in 2019)

The biggest unknown number is periodicals because they are cataloged, but not accessioned.

In December 2019 we had 7,274. We KNOW we added many more as we worked on cataloging the backlog, but we won't know the final total until we are able to take inventory (which includes counting how many of each type of library material.)

In 2012, when we moved into our present building, we had 16,776 items in the library collection. We can say with certainty that our library collection now has more than 22,000 cataloged items. No wonder we needed additional shelving! (Many thanks to Warren Brown and Jack Patterson.)

What's New at AmericanAncestors.org?

The New England Historic Genealogical Society (NEHGS) offers a quarterly webinar to present new material available to search from its website,

AmericanAncestors.org. All of these programs are recorded and are available on the website. If you have family roots in New England, then AmericanAncestors.org is probably the best place to explore them. New information in their databases could enhance the family genealogy data that you have and might even break down one of those pesky brick walls. The latest presentation on January 14, 2021, had several new and updated database highlights, among which are:

- General Society of Mayflower Descendants Membership Applications, 1620-1920. This is helpful to anyone with family connections to the original Mayflower passengers.
- The LeRoy Family in America, 1753-2003. The LeRoy family was in New York and this database contains genealogies of family members of several generations.
- Boston, MA: Provident Institution for Savings, 1817-1882. Those with Irish ancestors who came through Boston may find this new database particularly interesting.

Of use to almost anyone is free access to Newspapers.com World Collection until the end of January. For a short time, RVGS members can access Newspapers.com free of charge.




