## Success at the Family History Library

Our small, but intrepid, research group stepped "right off the boat and ready to work." We made the 2021 research trip to Salt Lake City's Family History Library this past October 4 through 10. Each of us enhanced our genealogical records in different and substantial ways.

Ann received help translating a Swedish church record and, in the process, learned about the mid 1800's government mandate that all citizens be vaccinated for smallpox. The vaccines had to be recorded by the local church minister and reported to the government annually. This knowledge fleshed out one of the reasons why Scandinavians emigrated to America, the land of the free. Many were not happy with their government and the amount of control it had over them.

Ron went to the FHL looking for a book about the ancestral hometown of his paternal grandfather. The only copy in the western United States resides on a shelf in the Family History Library. Ron was able to contact the author by email and learn about the local cemetery restoration project and their finds. He also spent hours combing the civil records of his maternal grandparents' German village and discovered family there back into the early 1700s. He even found that this family had originally emigrated from Amsterdam. Now he can research in an entirely new country.

Lee and his wife Gloria went to Salt Lake looking for records to bolster their DAR application. They spent hours successfully documenting their lineage.

Mary combined discoveries of a German edition book with immigration data for many of her German ancestors and their neighbors AND took advantage

of the FHL's new book-copying machine. It made copying pages easy and fast. (Walter Tenfelde's Auswanderungen und Auswanderer aus dem ehemaligen Kreise Lingen nach Nordamerika)

Loretta went in search of her great grandparents. She literally spent days combing the microfilms only available at the library. Success was hers, though. She found records for both her paternal and maternal great grandparents, including her maternal great grandparent's marriage record in Hilter, Hannover, Germany.

The biggest takeaway from our trip was that researching in the library gives access to records not available on the Internet and provides top-notch personal research assistance. The library's ancillary services are superb. We are all looking forward to getting "back on that boat" for next year's trip and hope many other RVGS members will join us.

**Thursday, November 11, 6:00-7:30 PM, Genealogy Newbies Interest Group**



## RVGS Quilt Raffle Tickets for Sale



The Giant Dahlia pattern is a medallion quilt designed by Hubert Ver Mehren of Des Moines, Iowa. The Iowa Button and Pleating Company was based in Des Moines and was Ver Mehren's primary business. He sold embroidery designs

stamped on textiles in the mid-1920s under the name of Home Art Studios. Eventually he and his wife, Mayme Jacobs, began creating full-sized medallion quilt patterns and kits. The Giant Dahlia pattern, either pieced or appliqued, was their most popular pattern during the 1930s.

The queen-sized quilt pictured here was machine pieced by Karen Asche of Medford, Oregon, in 2007 from templates by Marti Michell. Sherry Dewey, of Nebraska, did the long-arm quilting. The quilt is included in the Oregon Quilt Registry Project.


Nominations are now open for the 2022 officer positions for the Rogue Valley Genealogical Society Board of Directors, including president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and

RVGS owns a small select collection of quilts, primarily donated to RVGS by the Jacksonville Museum Quilters. The Table Rock quilt will be on display at JCGL throughout November.

Come see the quilt during the Library's open hours, Monday - Saturday, 1-4 p.m.



For thousands of years the rushing waters of the river known as "the Rogue" have carved the volcanic soils of Southern Oregon to form the 800-foot-tall mesas named the "Table Rocks." These weathered, intricately shaped mesas have become home to over 340 plants, including approximately 200 species of wildflowers. Eighteen of those wildflowers were recreated in stitchery for this quilt. Some, like the California Poppy, Shooting Star, and Indian

Paintbrush are well-known and seen frequently throughout Jackson County. The very small Sandwort, fuzzy Cat's Ears and striking Blue-eyed Marys are not as often seen along roadsides and in fields. Native Americans and some early homesteaders found uses for Common Camas (eating), Hound's Tongue (emits a fragrance, it has been planted around houses to keep rats and mice at bay) and Balsam Root (ate the sweet tasting roots either raw or cooked; ground the seeds to bake into bread.)

## Facebook Focus



Facebook is a wonderful resource for genealogists. There are a wealth of groups and pages that provide resources for everything from organizing, photos, and graveyards, to groups and pages focused

on research in specific counties, states, countries, and even specific surnames. There is something for everyone.

This month our focus is on the Facebook group *Ancestry.com Users Group* which is a "private" group. This means only members of the group can see who is in the group and what they have posted. "This group is for users of Ancestry.com and allows users to share tips, hints, suggestions and ask questions other users may be able to help with. While info on related products or services is welcome from users, advertising is not." The group has about 38,300 members, so getting help with your Ancestry questions is very likely. They have an extensive "Files" page with a lot of content including *Getting Started with Ancestry.com*. This is one of at least seven Facebook Groups focused on the Ancestry.com website. 

At this time, we do not know how long the at-home access to each site will last. The Board is taking advantage of sites that have offered a higher subscription rate to maintain at-home access, such as




The library has added five Gold Hill yearbooks from the 1920s to accompany the four issues from 1938-1941 on the shelf. Contents are
