Windows in Time: Acorn Woman Mountain: New Names Honor Native American Culture Wednesday, August 2, Noon - 1:00 PM, Medford Library, in person and

Last year, the U.S. Department of the Interior announced name changes for more than a dozen geographic features in Jackson and Josephine counties that used the word "squaw," a derogatory slur applied to Native American women. Rogue Valley journalist Vickie Aldous will discuss these new names for lakes, rivers and mountains and their origins from Native American legends – like the tale of Acorn Woman, a powerful mythological figure for the Takelma people of the Rogue Valley.

Aldous has lived in the Rogue Valley since 1999. She was a reporter for the *Ashland Daily Tidings* and *Medford Mail Tribune*, and Vickie currently works for the *Grants Pass Daily Courier* — a newspaper founded in 1885 that continues to publish today.

Windows in Time: Forest Creek: Where is Forest Creek?

Forest Creek is a tributary of the Applegate River. From its origins to the confluence, people have settled, mined, logged, built barns and schools, and buried their dead in the Log Town Cemetery. Annice Black will tell a story of the neighbors who populated the places along the Creek. The talk will cover from the 1850s to current days: the geography; early settlers; and economics of mining, farming, and logging. Her presentation includes photos of Forest

Creek School, mining on Forest Creek in the 1930s and early 40s, and Mt Isabelle Forest Fire Lookout. As autos sped up access to town, the schools consolidated, Forest Creek changed from a farm community to a commuter community.

- Take a morning stroll through Jacksonville history every Saturday while learning how a gold mining camp became the 19th Century hub of Southern Oregon.

- Tour the home of the town's wealthiest and most prominent pioneer family every Saturday and learn about local Victorian lifestyles.

Let's Talk Genealogy Roundtable



Susan began coming to Southern Oregon in the 1970s for the OSF performances. When her friends began moving here, she decided to follow and


moved to Rogue Valley Manor in 2007.

Don't Discount Historical Museums

In July this year, I
took my parents
back to their
hometown,
Kellogg, Idaho, for
an all-class high
school reunion.
They are from the

classes of 1953 and 1954. It was a great trip down memory lane for them and they told me stories of their life I had never heard. While there, we visited the little town of Mullan, Idaho, where my grandfather was born. Mom wanted to visit the little town historical museum while we were there as she wanted to meet the person who had recently published a book about the historic Finn population in Mullan. (According to the book, my great-greatgrandfather was the first Finn to settle in Mullan!) The person wasn't working that day, but the docent on duty gave him a call and he rushed down to meet us. While talking to him about our family history in Mullan, he said that he had some of our ancestors' family photos on his computer. He fired the computer up, and sure enough, he showed me a trove of photos of my family members from the area. Unfortunately, I didn't have a flash drive with me (always carry one when on the hunt), but I was able to take photos with my phone as he brought up each picture on the screen, not the best quality, but better than nothing. I also took some time going through binders of photos of the town and found a

photo of my great-great-grandfather's homestead and dairy that I had never seen before. I wish I had had more time to explore the museum, as I'm sure there were more family treasures to unbury!

Quilt in the Niche: A Child's Doodle Becomes Grandma's Dream



In January 2016, my grandson Zach came to my house after school with a handful of doodles, eager to show me what he'd drawn. One of those drawings tugged at me and invited me to make it into a quilt and a wonderful memory. I

asked Zach if I could have a copy of his design. He was 14 years old and in four years he'd be graduating from high school. Could Grandma figure out how to accomplish making the doodle into a quilt for a graduation gift?



In 2019 I found a fabric collection with a lot of colors, all in the same print, sort of stripy and definitely a wise choice for a "male" quilt. I ordered the fabric and started to figure out how to accomplish what I had envisioned. "Zach's Imagination" is only 4

identical blocks, but each block contains 264 squares, each turned to make it look woven. My husband and I designed and added the top and bottom borders. Then the real work began. Graduation day arrived in May 2020 and the quilt was complete. When presented with his gift at graduation, Zach said, "Grandma, you did it!" The smile on his face was all the thanks I needed. The hug was extra!
