II. OFFICERS

Required Officers

Under the old law a nonprofit corporation was only required to have a President and Secretary or officers with equivalent responsibilities. Nonprofit corporations are now also **required** to have a Treasurer. Additionally, the same person may not be the President, Secretary, and Treasurer.

Without the three required officers we **CANNOT** operate as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit. On behalf of the current RVGS Board of Directors we are asking you to please **SOS**: **Save Our Society!** Please consider running for one of these important roles. 
This meeting is being held in person at the RVGS library and everyone is welcome to attend.


Thursday, September 14, 6:00 - 7:30 PM, Genealogy Newbies Interest Group

The talk will cover from the 1850s to current days: the geography; early settlers; and economics of mining, farming, and logging. Her presentation includes photos of Forest Creek School, mining on Forest Creek in the 1930s

Windows in Time: The Tumultuous "Jackson County Rebellion:" One Historian's Personal Perspective Wednesday, October 4, noon - 1:00 PM Medford Library: In Person and online

During the early 1930s -- the "worst hard times" of the early Great Depression -- Jackson County experienced a political convulsion of political extremism. Two local demagogues relentlessly issued reckless (and untrue) charges and baseless accusations in their newspapers during the early Depression. Their campaign to wrest control of county government away from the local establishment successfully stoked resentment and anger among hard-pressed residents. Now known as the "Jackson County Rebellion," this dramatic episode gained Southern Oregon unwanted negative attention nationally. It ended in ballot theft and murder. Historian Jeff LaLande, who has authored the book: The Jackson County Rebellion: A Populist Uprising in Depression-Era Oregon, will discuss past events, as well as how he came to be interested in them and eventually came to write a book about what occurred in Jackson County. If attendees have read LaLande's book before attending the program, they will have the opportunity to pose questions and give comments to the presenter.

Jeff LaLande has been a resident of the Rogue Valley for over fifty-five years. He graduated from Georgetown University in Washington, D.C., and

later received his M.A. in archaeology from Oregon State University and a Ph.D. in history from the University of Oregon. He worked for over thirty years with the U.S. Forest Service as an archaeologist and historian and has published articles and several books on regional history.

After her retirement as a dental receptionist, Midge needed a


different focus. She spent time enjoying scrapbooking, amateur photography, and dabbled with tole painting. But she needed more.

Honorary Life Member Colleen Eccleston has died



Colleen Dorrette (Arthur) McCoy Eccleston died 7 August 2023 in Medford, Oregon.

Colleen was the daughter of May (Eicher) and Ray Arthur and was born 5 October

1936 in Medford, Oregon, the oldest of three children.

Colleen joined RVGS in January 1978 while living in Seattle. In 1991 she attended her Eagle Point High School reunion, where she reconnected with her high school friend Chuck Eccleston. They married in 1993. She became an RVGS volunteer in 1995, in charge of Publicity for 2 years with her husband Chuck. In 1997 she took responsibility for Education, and quickly added Book Selection to her responsibilities in 1998. She was librarian from at least 2003 through 2012, serving in 2007 as Head

Librarian. In December 2006 she was awarded Honorary Life Membership in recognition of her many years of outstanding service to the Society. She was a thorough and meticulous researcher and shared her research knowledge and capabilities graciously. She had a quiet sense of humor and shared interesting genealogical discoveries during RVGS bus trips returning from Salt Lake City. Perhaps most memorably, she and her husband Chuck took a two-month genealogical research trip across the United States, resulting in an informative RVGS program and major story in the *Mail Tribune*. (The story is on pages 49 and 50 of *1996-2006 Rogue Valley Genealogical Society, the 1st 40 Years*. 979.527 H388 1996.)

Colleen was preceded in death by her beloved husband and co-RVGS volunteer, Chuck Eccleston, and her brother, Morris Arthur. She is survived by her sisters-in-law Donna (Wolff) Arthur and Linda (Eccleston) Vanderlip; her youngest brother, James and Lindy (Melinda Lee Smith) Arthur; son Philip McCoy and his three adult children: Kevin McCoy, Kelly (McCoy) and Tim McLaurin II, and their children, Katala and Remi; Michael and Julia (Coulson) McCoy; daughter Karen McCoy; son Nathan McCoy and Kali-Ahset Amen (Nate's children in first group (1) and Kali-Ahset's children in second group (2)): (1) Kia (Coddington) Brubaker, and her children, Evelyn and Dean; Kyriana McCoy; and Kalina McCoy; and (2) Xiomara Strayhorn; and Joshua Strayhorn; as well as other numerous loved ones.





1923. Books published before 1923 are no longer protected by copyright. While some books (more and more each day) are available digitally online, many are not. One of the advantages of having a collection about a particular place on a single CD (or sometimes on a 2 or 3 CD set), is that someone has collected

them together, which is convenient for the researcher.


Some of the CDs contain historical books about entire states, but others focus on a specific county. Some are about an entire country such as Ireland. 




