Wills and Probate Records: Wills and Probate records can be genealogical goldmines. Sara Cochran will start with an overview of these records, the probate process, and tips for finding and using these records. This interactive class will show ways to turn a will into a starter family tree.

Sara has been researching her family tree for over 25 years. The journey has taken her into nearly every State in the USA and several countries worldwide, including Ireland, Britain, and Italy. She says her passion is telling the stories of the people in the family tree; genealogists do this best by recording the stories of their elders, locating, and preserving the photos and stories our ancestors left behind, as well as records created by the government and religious sources and in the newspaper.

RVGS High School Scholarship



Once again it is scholarship application time. Get the word out, tell your family and friends who have or know seniors at one of the high schools in Jackson County. This year's scholarship application and guidelines were sent to the Jackson County High Schools in the first week of November, and are also posted on the RVGS website.

This is the ninth year of our scholarship program. Previous awards have been given to students of Eagle Point, North Medford, South Medford, Ashland, and St. Mary's high schools. The \$2,000 award is to be used at an accredited college or university in Oregon.

The deadline for applying is March 8, 2024. The completed application and the required supporting documentation should be timely hand delivered or mailed to the RVGS Library at 3405 South Pacific Highway, Medford, Oregon 97501, so that it is received by the deadline. The selected awardee will be notified in writing by April 19, 2024.

If you have any questions, please contact Marilyn Ayres, scholarship chairman, at the library. Remember as you gather with your friends and family over the holidays in the coming months, talk about our scholarship program and about your own connection with our great Rogue Valley Genealogical Society. - An ancestor who was naturalized and the process they went through.
- An article about the oldest person buried in a cemetery.
- A How-To idea that would benefit others to include in the publication.

RVGS is currently 85 volunteers STRONG, but we could use a few more. If you are interested in any of these positions, please fill out the volunteer application.

Ashland Chamber of Commerce Greeters, RVGS Representative. This group meets every Friday at a different member business at 8:15 AM (and on the 4th Thursday of the month they meet at 5:15 PM.) RVGS would love to have someone attend at least one Greeters meeting each month, to share what's upcoming at RVGS, make our rack cards available, and answer any questions. It is a great opportunity to learn about Ashland (and other nearby) businesses, including other nonprofits. It is fun to showcase our upcoming classes, seminars, interest groups, and free programs.

Zoom Host Coordinator. Almost all of the RVGS classes and programs require a Zoom host (and sometimes two). While a number of Zoom hosts are trained, they need to be contacted and scheduled so that all events are adequately Zoom hosted. Most months in 2024 there will be 2 or 3 events requiring Zoom hosts. Not a big task, but a very necessary one!

Quilt in the Niche: Medford's Train Centennial



Medford's Train Centennial

Dimension: 82 inches by 75-1/2 inches

Completed: 1985

The Oregon & California Railroad began laying track outside Portland, Oregon, in 1869. Lack of money ended rail construction in 1874 when the tracks reached Roseburg. After a ten-year delay, building resumed, new roadbeds were cleared, tunnels dug, and trestles built. The town of Medford was created when the railroad tracks were built through the middle of the Rogue Valley in January 1885. It took almost three years for the railroad builders to conquer the Siskiyou Mountains further south. December 17, 1887, a "gold spike" ceremony was held in Ashland, finally connecting the states of Oregon and California by rail. Medford's growth exploded when pear and other fruit orchards were planted in the early 1900s.

Consistent with the mission of the Jacksonville Museum Quilters to preserve the history of the area through quilts, they contacted Carl P. Strand, a local artist, who agreed to create the drawing of the engine using a photo from Southern Oregon Historical Society's collection in

the fall of 1984. Thus began the life of the Medford Train Centennial quilt.

This marvelous quilt will be on display at the Rogue Valley Genealogical Society Library, 3405 S. Pacific Hwy, Medford, Oregon during the month of January 2024.


