### **RVGS Strong in 2024 and Beyond**

In 2019 we surveyed RVGS members and learned a great deal about what our members value, what they wish we would do, and what we didn't need to do any longer. 

## Monday, April 8, 2024, 2:00 – 3:30 PM, Colonial America Interest Group


The Colonial America Interest Group meets the 2<sup>nd</sup> Monday of the even numbered months. Beginning in April we will revert to a zoom only format as group members have shown no interest in attending in

person at the library.

Our topic for April will be a deep dive into the Great Migration and the Great Migration Study Project. The Great Migration refers to the period between 1620 and 1640 when thousands of people left England to seek religious freedom in New England. In 1989 Robert Charles Anderson initiated a project to write biographical sketches on each head of household who made the trip. Though Anderson has now retired the project continues and the first volume in the latest series, covering 1636-1638, has just been published. Over the years there have been numerous spinoff books and articles in addition to the sketches covering 1620 through 1635, all of which have been published by the New England Historical and Genealogical Society.

In the April session we will take a close look at these materials and how they can shed light on our early New England Ancestors.

Railroads have played a pivotal role in the history and development of Southern Oregon. Robert Hirning will examine how the construction of our own Siskiyou Line influenced the present-day economies of Jackson and Josephine Counties. Join us for a discussion on the rise of "Robber Barons," inept train robbers, and the failed attempts to reach the California Coast that kept our region uniquely isolated.

Robert Hirning has been a lifelong "railfan" and has chased his passion for trains since childhood. Robert has traveled widely by train over most of North America, from the Arctic to the Tropics, and across Asia from the Sea of Japan to the Baltic.



2<sup>nd</sup> Saturday March through May. Explore the "Secrets & Mysteries of the Beekman Bank"

Historic Jacksonville, Inc. opens the oldest financial institution in the Pacific Northwest for evening lantern light tours. Regional historian Ben Truwe pursues secrets thought lost with the last Beekman family member in 50-minute tours beginning at 5:00 PM, 6:15 PM, and 7:30 PM each tour night. The bank was begun by C.C. Beekman as a gold dust office in 1856 and moved in 1863 to its current location at 110 W. California Street in Jacksonville when he became the Wells Fargo Agent. Beekman saw over \$40 million in gold cross his counters during Jacksonville's heyday in the 1800s—equivalent to over \$1 billion in today's currency! Tours are limited to a maximum of 12 people, admission is \$5 per person, and reservations are required. 

guidelines were sent to the Jackson County High Schools in the first week of November and are posted on the RVGS website. Click here.

This is the ninth year of our scholarship program. Previous awards have been given to students of Eagle Point, North Medford, South Medford, Ashland, and St. Mary's high schools. The \$2,000 award is to be used at an accredited college or university in Oregon.



The deadline for applying is 4 PM, March 9, 2024.

The completed application and the required supporting documentation should be timely hand delivered or mailed to the RVGS Library at 3405 South Pacific Highway, Medford, Oregon 97501, so that it is received by the deadline. The selected awardee will be notified in writing by April 19, 2024.



Conceived by the RVGS Quilt Advisory Committee and designed by Sue Waldron, the quilt was made by sub-committee members: Karen Asche, Nell Mathern, Cheryl Luschen and Sue Waldron. It was completed in September 2016. The quilt is dedicated to the many volunteers over the last fifty years who have made the Society what it is today. There are family names of ninety-four RVGS members displayed on the quilt. Also displayed are a number of items that represent significant events in the history of the area.

Evidence Explained! The brand new, hot off the press 4<sup>th</sup> edition (2024) of Elizabeth Shown Mills' masterpiece is here! Described as: "a thoroughly modern revision, introducing seven basic building blocks that can be mixed and matched to create a citation for any kind of source. Elizabeth shows how these building blocks can be layered to create 14 templates instead of the hundreds previously employed. The result greatly simplifies things, and will be a breath of fresh air for those who've found creating citations to be complex." (929.11 Mil 2024)




