#### **RVGS Strong in 2024 and Beyond**



The RVGS Quilt Committee has begun work on one of its long-range goals: to write and publish a book about the quilts in our collection and the genealogy of the quiltmakers and/or local pioneer families responsible for some of the quilts. The writing has already begun, as has researching possible grant opportunities. Publishing a book with high quality color photographs will be expensive. The RVGS Board has agreed to dedicate the revenue from the 2024 and 2025 raffle quilts towards the book's publication. The 2024 raffle

quilt winner will be drawn on Tuesday, June 25, so purchase your raffle tickets soon to own the United States Bicentennial Embroidered Quilt!

Road work on South Pacific Highway, (aka Highway 99), in front of the Genealogy Library has been going on since August. We recently learned that we are scheduled to become even more thoroughly involved in this highway improvement project, as surveying of our highway frontage and location of utility lines on our property will be intermittently underway throughout 2024. The project which began in August involves the utilities under the highway from the south approximately to our property



line. The new project, which begins with the surveying, will take the highway improvements further north, eventually all the way to Garfield Street. This project is likely to have an impact on RVGS both in the short term (inconvenient access) and possibly into the future.

Our topic for June will be Massachusetts and the Province of Maine. From the Mayflower to the "shot heard round the world" which kicked off the American Revolution, the part of New England now known as Massachusetts has played a key role in American History. Maine was never a colony in its own right and did not detach from Massachusetts until 1820, nearly 50 years after the Declaration of Independence. We'll look at patterns of settlement, the wealth of available records for this period

in New England, and the French and Indian Wars which deeply impacted the lives of our ancestors. We'll wrap up with a recap of the role of this area in the Revolutionary



War which brought an end to the colonial era. We are now meeting on zoom only as group members have shown no interest in attending in person at the library. Zoom only. Cost: Free to all.

Windows in Time: A Century in Big Applegate

In the second half of the 19th century, a group of Indigenous women survived the 1868-69 smallpox epidemic and avoided removal to reservations more than once. These women and their white husbands eventually left the mining camps on Kanaka Gulch and Forest Creek for the lush valley of Big Applegate, as interracial couples were often not accepted in Jacksonville. Presenter Laura Ahearn will share the surprising stories of these women, their descendants, and others who joined the vibrant community that became known as Watkins before it was

destroyed in the 1970s to build the Applegate Dam. These stories are based on the photo albums and family lore of descendants who still live in Jackson and Shasta Counties, corroborated and sometimes corrected by intensive research into governmental records and newspaper archives.

Using items from the SOHS Collection as a starting point, Dr. Anna Sloan will explore expressions of LGBTQ+ life, identity, community, and resilience in Southern Oregon over the past 150+ years. Learn how the western frontier made space for some settlers' alternative gender and sexual identities while simultaneously erasing Indigenous expressions of the same. Explore how changing social mores of the early 20th century affected peoples' lives and livelihoods. Hear more recent stories of local LGBTQ+ community-building, meaning-making, artistry, and

resilience, even in the face of discrimination and violence. Additionally, attendees will learn about new efforts at SOHS to integrate more of these stories into our collection -- and why this task is as challenging as it is important.

Dr. Anna Sloan (she/her/hers) is the Curator of Collections for the Southern Oregon Historical Society (SOHS), and a Research Archaeologist with the Southern Oregon University Laboratory of Anthropology (SOULA). She is passionate about connecting communities with their histories through the objects that reflect our lived experiences -- from the smallest of pottery sherds to the largest of wagon wheels.

Your RVGS Membership Includes Free Use of Many Genealogy Subscription Sites!

Did you know that RVGS Members can use *Find My Past*, *Fold3*, *MyHeritage*, *Ancestry.com* and other subscription genealogy sites for free? This is a huge membership benefit, and it gets even better when you can choose to access these sites from the RVGS Library computers or, (with the exception of *Ancestry.com*), from your computer at home. Go to <a href="https://rvgslibrary.org/index.asp">https://rvgslibrary.org/index.asp</a> and sign in (upper right) using your email address and password. After signing in, go to the home page and scroll down to the Subscription Websites. RVGS has these subscriptions for our use, and, throughout 2024, we will be featuring classes to help you get started using these sites.

On April 4, Daniel Horowitz, Genealogy Expert for *MyHeritage*, introduced us to *MyHeritage*, its many resources and how to search the site. *MyHeritage* has over 20 million historical records, 47 million family trees and 7.4 million DNA kits. They also have exclusive international databases and global name translation technology that will help you to find your ancestors in countries where you aren't familiar with variations for names or certain alphabets. You didn't have to attend the class to get started, so give *MyHeritage* 

a try, either from home or from the RVGS Library. A tip from Mr. Horowitz is to be sure to check out the categories list on the side of your search form.

Other subscription sites that members can access for free from home or the RVGS Library, include *HistoryGeo*, *American Ancestors*, *Newspaper Archive* and *Newspapers.com Oregon Collection. Ancestry.com* is available only at the RVGS Library, but it's still free there. On May 31, our own Jeanne Hoadley will conduct a class on how to use *HistoryGeo*. If you've ever tried to figure out where your ancestor's property was by using section, range and township, you'll be excited to learn how to put it on a map using *HistoryGeo*. They have first landowners' information, old maps and more that I'm looking forward to learning how to access and use in Jeanne's class. See you there!

#### **QUILT IN THE NICHE**

#### The Watermaster's Quilt

Begun as a personal challenge, this quilt has become a tool used to educate the public about the role of the Watermaster in Jackson County as a local liaison with the Oregon Department of Water Resources in Salem.


During the planning phase, it was decided that the quilt should include references to the various tools and personnel who are needed to complete the goals of the Oregon Water Resources Department. These goals are to: promote the development, control, conservation, preservation, and utilization of the water resources of the State of Oregon. In addition, the quilt serves as a "cheat sheet" or informational prop for a new employee learning the "correct terms" to explain Oregon Water Law.

There are sixteen small and twelve large photographic images reproduced on fabric squares. Photocopying on fabric was a new process in 1995. The photographs show the people and tools used every day. The twelve logo patches identify the local organizations with which the office staff work. Of the five remaining blocks in the quilt, three are appliqued, one is counted cross stitch embroidery, and the last is pieced – there are fourteen scraps of fabric depicting fourteen representatives of

the wildlife which benefit from the state law which requires minimum river water levels. The quilt is embellished with buttons: two owls, two swallows, two turtles and one bunny. Can you find them all?

The quilt was completed in September 1995 by Sue Waldron. It was displayed at the 1996 Jacksonville Museum Quilters show and in 1997 it was taken to the Oregon State Fair in Salem where it was awarded a red ribbon. The quilt is usually on display in the Watermaster's Office on the third floor of the Jackson County Courthouse. It is an educational tool and a non-threatening conversation starter.

The Watermaster's Quilt will be on display at RVGS in May 2024 and will be the subject of a "Quilts and Genealogy" program on Thursday, May 30, at 1:30. The quiltmaker, Sue Waldron, will not only discuss the purpose and design of the quilt, but will also share why genealogists should investigate water records as they research their ancestors.

#### **Scholarship News 2024**


\$2,000 scholarship award announced.

The Scholarship committee is pleased to announce the award for this year's Rogue Valley Genealogical Society scholarship to Mr. Fugui Slawta, a senior at Ashland High School. Fugui maintains an outstanding GPA, finishing his high school classes with Statistics, AP Economics, Politics in Literature, Introduction to Manufacturing, and Government.

He is active in school sports: competing in water polo this past fall, and three years on the swim team. A strong swimmer, in a recent meet Fugui placed first in three events: the 50-yard freestyle and 100 freestyle races, and anchoring the 400-yard freestyle. He has competed in individual and team events at district and competed at the state championships all 3 years.

He has worked at the Ashland Family YMCA as a lifeguard and swim instructor for a year and a half.

He has volunteered with the Southern Oregon Humane Society and with the Ashland Public Library. In grades 4-8 he attended the Trails Outdoor School where he spent 450 hours building and maintaining trails and building a



community space. Fugui currently volunteers at aid stations for gravel bike races. At the age of 5 he competed in his first 5K race. At eight he competed and won the Mt. Diablo Cycling Hill Climb, a record that stands today. Born in China, Fugui was adopted from an orphanage at age four and brought to the United States. Originally fearful of water, he overcame his fears and believes that relying on persistence is more important than motivation in achieving his goals.

He will attend the University of Oregon to pursue a degree in business. He has a passion for finance and how the economy works, and an interest in culinary arts. He may perhaps combine his business and culinary interests to establish his own business.


This is the ninth year of the RVGS scholarship program benefiting students in our community.
