GENEALOGY'S STAKE IN FEDERAL FUNDING



The 2026 federal budget proposal released in early May has raised serious concerns in the genealogical community. The proposal targets the elimination of the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA), the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH), and the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). Additionally, cost-cutting measures by the Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE) have already reduced staffing and grant funding for the NEH and IMLS. In February, Dr. Colleen Shogan was removed as Archivist of the United States, with Secretary of State Marco Rubio appointed

as Acting Archivist of the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA). As family historians, these changes could significantly impact our research capabilities.

Many of us rely daily on NARA's resources. This independent agency preserves



documents essential to our family research—census records, military service files, immigration records, and numerous other irreplaceable materials. The ongoing digitization efforts have been transformative, allowing us to access documents from our homes that once required trips to Washington, D.C. NARA also supports the National Historical Publications and Records Commission (NHPRC), which provides critical grant funding to local and state archives nationwide. If you've used a local or state archive for your research, chances are it has benefited from NHPRC assistance. & Records Commission grants page.) Without experienced archivists directing NARA, the future of open access to our nation's records and continued funding for preservation efforts nationwide remains uncertain.

The NEH and IMLS may be less familiar to some members, but their impact on our research is substantial. Both organizations have directly funded countless preservation and digitization projects through libraries, museums, and historical societies. The IMLS's Grants to States program provides approximately 25% of the State Library of Oregon's annual budget. Losing this funding threatens numerous services to Oregon libraries, including staffing, programs, and digitization initiatives that many of us use regularly. Oregon Humanities, our state affiliate of the NEH, awards numerous public program grants and mini-grants to rural libraries. They have already announced that their Public Program Grants are on hold due to the loss of NEH funding.

Recognizing these concerns, the presidents of the Rogue Valley Genealogical Society, the Genealogical Forum of Oregon (Portland), and the Oregon Genealogical Society (Eugene) jointly submitted a letter to all eight Oregon congressional representatives in May. The letter expresses our collective support for continued proper



funding and professional management of NARA, NEH, and IMLS. We understand these institutions are fundamental to preserving our ability to research family heritage.

If you share these concerns about maintaining access to the historical records that help us tell our families' stories, we encourage you to contact your congressional representatives with your personal perspective on this issue.


Wednesday, June 11, 1:30 – 3:00 PM, Great Lakes Interest Group

The Applegate Trail Quilt was completed in 1987 by the Jacksonville Museum Quilters. Using photographs taken in 1976, Artist Evelyn Williams and Master Quilter Dora Scheidecker created a tribute to the re-enactment of an historic covered wagon train's travels from Keno to Jacksonville in Southern Oregon. Local historian Sue Waldron will share more about this hand quilted wall hanging with detailed applique images and delicate embroidery and about "Wagon Master" George McUne's adventure in this program in the "Quilts and Genealogy" series.

QUILT IN THE NICHE: APPLEGATE WAGON TRAIN

The full name of this quilt "Bicentennial Applegate Trail – Applegate Wagon Train 1846 – 1976" is a bit confusing. Bicentennial usually means the two-hundredth anniversary of a significant event, yet if you do the math, 1846 to 1976 is only 130 years? What were the Jacksonville Museum Quilters commemorating when they designed and made this quilt in 1987?

Forty-nine years ago, on June 6, 1976, six horse drawn covered wagons left their campsite outside the small unincorporated community of Keno in Klamath County, Oregon. Back in 1974 when the Jackson County bicentennial committee started planning the local celebration of the United States signing the Declaration of Independence, they approached George McUne. Would he lead a re-enactment of a covered wagon trip on the Applegate Trail? McUne had participated in several other re-enactments. He also built and ran the Pioneer Village in downtown Jacksonville. McUne began construction of the Village in 1961. When completed in 1964 the Village offered visitors an adventure into Jacksonville's past with authentic buildings from nearby locations that were filled with historic relics. Inside the village stockade, visitors watched western fights and "black snake whip" demonstrations. They took pony rides and boarded a

stagecoach. They could also watch a blacksmith making hand rolled wagon tires, enjoy a Victorian melodrama, explore Yreka's Dogtown Saloon, or visit a jail, a moonshiner's cabin, or a little red schoolhouse.

McUne agreed to lead a re-enactment trip on the Applegate Trail for the Bicentennial celebration. In 1974 McUne started construction of six covered wagons. The party arrived back in Jacksonville on July 4, 1976.

Dora Scheidecker began planning the Jacksonville Museum Quilters' next history related quilt in 1985. Each year the group made a new quilt to feature at their yearly show. Working with artist Evelyn Williams and using albums compiled by Mrs. McUne, this quilt was created. You are invited to the Rogue Valley Genealogical Society Library at 1:00 p.m. on Thursday, June 26 to learn more about this hand quilted wall hanging with detailed applique images and delicate embroidery that depicts the story of the 1976 covered wagon trip.



STEP BEHIND THE COUNTER OF THE OLDEST FINANCIAL INSTITUTION IN THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST!

You are invited to "Step Behind the Counter" of the oldest financial institution in the Pacific Northwest— Jacksonville's 1863 Beekman Bank Museum—when Historic Jacksonville, Inc. opens the museum for summer tours. Established as a "gold dust" office in 1856, it was the first "bank" north of San Francisco.

Scheduled 2025 "banking hours" are **11 am to 3 pm, Saturdays and Sundays, from May 24 through August 31.** The Beekman Bank Museum is located at 110 W.
California Street (the corner of California and North 3rd streets) in Jacksonville. Guests can interact with costumed docents sharing stories of late 19th
Century banking practices, gold shipping, and handshake deals; step behind the counter and peer in drawers containing old checks, stage schedules, and paperwork; and enter the vault that stored millions in gold!

Visitors can spend as much or as little time as they like—although we suggest they allow at least 30 minutes.

Tours are *FREE*, but donations are encouraged since all monies go towards the preservation and maintenance of this historic legacy!

The original bank was established in 1856 as a "gold dust" office. (If we're factual, it was a safe.) Cornelius Beekman had come to Jacksonville in 1854 as an express rider between Yreka and Jacksonville carrying newspaper, mail, parcels, and gold over the Siskiyous.

When his employer's firm failed, he established Jacksonville's Beekman's Express and his gold dust office. In 1863 he became Jacksonville's Wells Fargo agent and constructed the Beekman Bank.

During Jacksonville's heyday as the governmental, commercial, and social hub of Southern Oregon in the late 1800s, the Beekman's Bank saw over \$40 million in gold cross its counters—equivalent to over \$1 billion today! The current 1863 structure is the only commercial wooden building on California Street to survive Jacksonville's many fires. It has been preserved intact as a museum since Cornelius Beekman, the wealthiest and most prominent of Jacksonville's pioneers, locked the doors in 1915.



The Jewish Genealogical Society of Oregon's next program: Using Social Media for Genealogical Research

This program will introduce family researchers to many helpful genealogical resources available on social media



platforms and how to use these tools safely. The presentation includes examples of best practices for using social media in genealogical records research, how to find long-lost family members, and the benefits of location-focused research groups. Robin will also discuss case studies from two Facebook groups she coadministers: Tracing the Tribe: Jewish Genealogy on Facebook, and Jewish Community of the 15th Ward, Syracuse New York.



An attorney and genealogist, speaker Robin Meltzer assists families in obtaining legal records, discovering nontraditional information sources, and interpreting documentary evidence. She is an administrator of Tracing the Tribe: Jewish Genealogy on Facebook; cofounder of the Jewish Community of the 15th Ward, Syracuse, New York, Facebook group; associate producer of the documentary films "Stories from the Syracuse Jewish Community" and "People and Places of the Syracuse Jewish Community"; and a former vice president of the Jewish Genealogy Society of Greater Washington. She lectures internationally on topics in Jewish genealogy and research methods and has appeared on the cable television program "Tracing Your Family Roots." Robin has written articles on Jewish genealogy and local history for several publications, including Avotaynu, Mishpacha, The Galitzianer, and the Jewish Observer of Central New York.

57 new titles, including 3 sets of microfiche, were added to the RVGS Library collection in May. They range from *Water Rights in Oregon* (979.5 G165 OWR) to *Art of Heraldry: an Encyclopedia of Armory* (Circ 929.6 Fox), and from 13 family histories (929.2

surname) to books about 14 states and 4 foreign countries. Perhaps the most intriguing is the addition of new books about Paleography (also known as Handwriting) to help us as we try to decipher the handwriting in old records (and more recent ones, too). As RVGS launches a transcription project in anticipation of the celebration of the 250th anniversary of the United States of America in 2026, the Book Committee was delighted to discover two new books to purchase...and the catalogers were pleased to place them in 417 with several books already in our collection. Search? Search what? On the RVGS website one of the major tabs is labeled "Search." WHAT does it search? The MANY indexes of Jackson and some Josephine County sources that have information about people who lived in Jackson and Josephine counties. This includes **indexes** to obituaries, death certificates, marriage records, newspaper and other periodical notices of births, marriages, and deaths, school records, church records, cemetery records, and local history books. Many, but not all, of the index entries lead to actual images, some of transcriptions, some of the originals. Some are in books in the RVGS Library. Some are in digital format, which the librarians can access on their computers. Some lead you to the courthouse. The cemetery entries provide all of the available information, including many (not all) photographs of gravestones in local cemeteries. Many RVGS members do not have ancestors who lived here, but may become interested in the original owner of the land they now live on, or in someone important to local history. Is there an intriguing local road name? Who was Roxy Ann?

"Search" may lead you to answers!




